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Australia's wildlife

Unique plants and animals

Australia has developed a unique range of plants and animals that have **adapted** to the low rainfall and poor soil. Australia has more than 25,000 species of plants and around 250,000 species of animal life.

The tropical rainforests in the east are some of the oldest **ecosystems** in the world. The tree kangaroo and the birdwing butterfly live in this habitat.

The Australian bush

Near the coast, in the east, south-east, and south-west, are open woodlands. These areas are generally referred to as the Australian bush. Eucalyptus trees grow here and can withstand drought, bush fires, and poor soil. Gray kangaroos and koalas live only in these areas.

Australia is famous for **marsupials**. These are extinct everywhere else in the world, except for South America. The best known are the kangaroo and the smaller wallaby. Birds, such as kookaburras, parrots, and budgerigars, are also found in the bush.

Dangerous creatures

Australia is the home of more deadly spiders and reptiles than anywhere else in the world. The deadliest spider is the redback and the worst snake is the taipan. The most dangerous animal to humans is the saltwater crocodile of northern Australia.
