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# Let's Get Ready to Read!

This guide will help your reader explore, examine, and engage with the fiction book *What Filled the Spot?* by Lisa Thompson. The included activities will strengthen their reading comprehension skills and provide them with opportunities to write and talk about the text. Your young reader will develop their own points of view on the book and its characters as they analyze the text in more structured and detailed ways. Help your reader on their reading journey by reading with them, asking and answering questions along the way, and offering guidance and support, as needed. Be sure to read through pages 4–6 for helpful instructional ideas.

On this page, you will find discussion questions to ask your reader after having finished the book as well as some fun activities to help foster your young reader's love of reading!

## Just 4 Fun!

- Work with other parents or teachers to arrange a book club meeting so your reader can discuss the book with peers. Provide a comfy, cool setting and some yummy treats!
- Set up a book nook! Find a quiet corner. Add a few blankets and pillows. Maybe grab a beanbag chair or poof! Be sure there is a lamp or overhead light and—*voila!*—you have a nifty nook any reader would love.
- Challenge your reader to become one of the characters from the book for an interview. Have your reader dress the part. Then, have them answer your questions as that character.

2. Could this story be true? Could it really happen?
3. Do you like the characters? Could you be their friend?  
Why or why not?
4. What is your favorite part of the story? Tell me all about it!
5. Would you recommend this book to your friends? Why or why not?

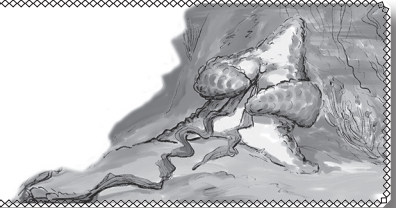
**Directions:** Read the sentence. Change the underlined word to another word that means the same thing.

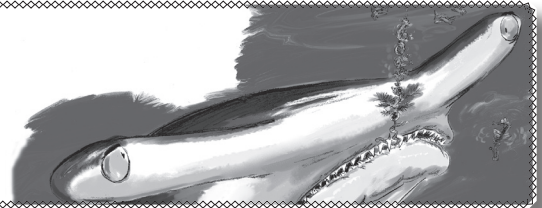
